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





## A Trip to the spoke wheel maker. 4th June 2023.

















### A Trip to the spoke wheel maker. 4th June 2023.





We were certainly blessed for our first winter club run, with mild temperatures and bright sunshine. After meeting for coffee and a chat at the BP servo at Officer, we had a short drive to the home and workshops of Matt Weeks, at Koo Wee Rup North. Matt is best known for his spoke wheel repairs, but he also has a full restoration facility as can be seen in the photos.

After sticky buns and tea and coffee, Matt demonstrated the manufacture of wooden wheel spokes. He has a machine that copies from a sample and produces four spokes at a time, from specially selected and cut timber. We then were able to roam around Matt's workshops and study his projects in progress. In the main workshop area, Matt had a sheet metal guillotine, a folder and welding equipment. He also had a large lathe for manufacturing parts as well as a comprehensive tool set. Projects in the workshop were a Dodge 4 undergoing a total restoration, a very early Daimler for which Matt was making body panels, and a Chevrolet truck. Behind the main workshop was a "Body shop". There Matt was working on a Holden FJ ute, and a WW2 Willys Jeep. Matt's own Dodges were also on display.

Altogether a very interesting couple of hours, and it is terrific to see some of the traditional skills being used, in an age where such skills are being lost.

From there, we took another short drive in the sunshine to Koo Wee Rup, to the Royal hotel, for lunch. Some really excellent meals were served up and the \$20 Seniors Meals were more than adequate. Another couple of hours relaxing and chatting followed before we all headed home well satisfied.











### A MISNOMER By John Jenkins.

Sir Vival was to be the car of the future. It would seriously challenge existing car design. A safety conscious public was expected eschew conventional cars and live longer. NONE of this occurred. Bridget Driscol has earned an unenviable place in The Guinness Book Of Records. In 1896, she walked in front of a car. Although it was travelling at only 6 or 7 km/hr, she became the first road fatality. At that time, an authority proclaimed that steps must be taken to ensure that such a tragedy must never be repeated. If only.

In Australia, 700 people died in road accidents in 1925. The toll had risen to 1643 killed in 1950, and 2468 fatalities in 1960. Road toll in USA, during the 1950's, ranged from a low of 34763 in 1950 to a high of 39628 in 1956.

Jerome Walter from Massachusetts decided that action must be taken, and that he was the person for the task. Jerome was an engineering graduate who lamented that car companies preferred style and body changes to safety. His Sir Vival had safety features that were not adopted for several years by other auto manufacturers. These included seat belts and a strengthened body via a roll cage, side lights, air bags and shock absorbing bumpers.


A motorist in an old car may be struck by the steering wheel, or crushed by a dislodged motor. A modern car has a collapsible steering column and a construction that causes the motor to deflect down in a collision. Jerome's Sir Vival may have received greater acceptance had he pioneered such features. Instead he created a two part vehicle so that the engine and front wheels were separate from the passenger compartment. This was done via an articulated joint. In an accident, the passengers were to be protected by the sections swiveling about that joint. As this occurred, the impact of the collision would be greatly reduced as energy was absorbed. The same principle of energy absorption is used in today's cars via a crumple zone.

As prevention is better than cure, the driver's visibility was panoramic. The driver's seat was almost one metre above passengers to provide an unobstructed view.

Jerome commenced his project with a 1948 Hudson, and persevered for ten years. By then, his Sir Vival bore minimal resemblance to the Hudson. He spent years endeavoring to find investors, and displayed his Sir Vival at several car shows. Publicity was also gained via features in magazines.

His endeavors failed to gain public acceptance. Appearance was a significant reason, and so was price. Cost was double that of the then current Cadillac.

His prototype remains the sole production. It was stored for many years. Its owner has refused purchase offers, and so it languishes in storage for the foreseeable future. Preservation will occur, but restoration awaits some hard to find parts, and an enthusiast with much money and determination.

## The story of the first pedestrian road death. 17th August 1897.

The death of Bridget Driscoll (c.1851 – 17 August 1896) was the first recorded case of a pedestrian killed in a collision with a motor car. Mrs. Driscoll, in the company of her teenage daughter, May, and her friend Elizabeth Murphy, was crossing Dolphin Terrace in the grounds of the Crystal Palace in London when she was struck by the car belonging to the Anglo-French Motor Carriage Company that was being used to give demonstration rides. One witness described the car as being driven at "a reckless pace, in fact, like a fire engine". Arthur Edsell was driving the car he personally tuned to a speed of 4.5 miles per hour during the demonstration run on a public road. The car, a Roger-Benz, was the property of the Anglo-French Motor Company ltd. During the inquest, witnesses said that the other two cars were at least 35 yards in advance of the third car which was running quickly, and the deceased woman did not see the notice boards "Beware of horseless carriages" posted up in the grounds.



Despite being ample room for the cars to pass, it is believed that driver, Arthur Edsell, had lost control, coming in a zig-zag fashion instead of straight ahead. The driver and one of his two passengers during the exhibition ride, Miss Ellen Standing, claimed that Mr. Edsell had rung his bell and shouted a warning. Several hours later the jury reached a verdict of accidental death. The coroner at the inquest hoped that "such a thing would never happen again". The Crystal Palace company announced that they would bear the cost of Mrs. Driscoll's funeral.

Émile Roger bought a car from Benz in 1887. Soon after, he was selling Benz vehicles in France. In 1888 he founded his own automobile manufacturing company in Paris. Marketing was as Roger or Roger-Benz, as the vehicles were based on models made by Benz. Production ended in 1896. The Anglo-French Motor Carriage Company Ltd. from Birmingham, under the direction of Frank Gardner and Léon L'Hollier sold the vehicles in England between 1896 and 1897 under the brand name Anglo-French. The British company 'International Motor Car' also manufactured cars in its early years that corresponded to the Roger-Benz models.



The death of Elaine Herzberg (August 2, 1968 – March 18, 2018) was the first recorded case of a pedestrian fatality involving a self-driving car, after a collision that occurred late in the evening of March 18, 2018. Herzberg was pushing a bicycle across a four-lane road in Tempe, Arizona, United States, when she was struck by an Uber test vehicle, which was operating in self-drive mode with a human safety backup driver sitting in the driving seat. Herzberg was taken to the local hospital where she died of her injuries.[

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents estimated 550,000 people had been **killed on UK roads by 2010.** (All the above was taken from information found on the WWW.by Editor.)

Joy and Lindsay received this award for their 60 plus years of community service. They have always supported each other in whatever community organizations they have been involved with. These include the C.F.A., the Lioness Club, the Country Women's Association, local Football Clubs, School Councils, For 20 years, they supported the Breakfast for Students at the Koo Wee Rup Secondary School as well as cooking and delivering meals for local people in need.

They are both foundation and Honorary Life Members of the Dandenong Valley Historic Car Club Inc. They are foundation members of Masonic Unique Car Club.

They are awarded for helping set up and run the animal nursery at the Dandenong show for 40 years, where Joy was also made an Honorary Life Member.

There have been many other thing along the way whilst both were working full time and raising their boys.

Many thanks to Vic Wren and all his hard work in organizing and nominating them for this very special award.

On a personal note, thanks for being my big sister and my brother- in- law. You have always been ready with open arms to help myself and all your friends at any given moment.

# Easy sausage roll recipe Time to make. 50 min Difficulty Easy.

#### Ingredients.

- **Puff Pastry Sheets**
- 1 kg Sausage Mince
- 1 Medium Brown Onion, finely diced
- 1 Medium Carrot, finely grated
- 1 Medium Zucchini, finely grated
- 3 Cloves Garlic, minced
- 2 Eggs
- 30g Tomato Paste
- 50ml BBQ Sauce
- 40ml Worcestershire Sauce
- 75g Breadcrumbs
- 80g Parmesan Cheese
- 15g Fresh Parsley, chopped
- Black Pepper to taste
- Sea Salt Flakes to taste.

#### Method.

- Place diced onion, grated carrot, grated zucchini and garlic in the large bowl. Pour over the tomato paste, BBQ sauce, Worcestershire sauce and egg. Add in salt and pepper. Give it all a thorough mix with a whisk until everything is combined.
- Add in the mince, mix with the vegetables together. Sprinkle over the breadcrumbs, cheese and parsley and keep mixing until it all comes together.
- Cut the pastry sheets in half or third, depending on the size. 3.
- Arrange the mince mix in a log shape along the centre of each pastry sheet. Brush one long 4. side of pastry with the egg and roll up to enclose filling.
- Cut each giant sausage roll into two normal sized ones, or six party sized rolls. Place seam side down on a baking tray lined with baking paper. Make sure each roll is at least 3cm apart so the pastry will puff properly.
- 6. Egg wash each sausage roll.
- 7. Put the sausage rolls in the preheated oven and bake at 190C for 30-35 minutes, or until the pastry is golden brown.
