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

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100 YEARS OF LEGACY

I guess you have all heard of the organisation known as Legacy. For those of you who haven't, I'll explain. Legacy is an Australian non-profit organisation established in 1923 by ex-servicemen. Legacy provides support to the families of Australian Defense Force men and women who have lost their life or health in conflicts such as World War I, World War II, Vietnam War, Iraq and Afghanistan.

In WWI some 60,000 Australian service personnel were killed and more than 150,000 were wounded, many dying soon after. Once realizing the dire circumstances of the tens of thousands of World War One veterans' widows and children, who were left behind, some of those who returned set out to help them. In 1923, Major General Sir John Gellibrand formed the Remembrance Club in Hobart. Another returning soldier, then Assistant Brigade Major Stanley Savige, was inspired to establish a similar club in Melbourne which was named Legacy.



Ever since the Legacy promise was made by a soldier to his dying mate in the trenches of WW1 to "look after the missus and the kids", Legacy supports Australian Defense Force families in times of great need. It was a simple promise that Legacy keeps today; providing the same stability, guidance and assistance that a partner would normally provide to his or her family. Today, Legacy still supports some 40,000 partners and children of veterans who gave their lives or health serving our country. Legacy's work means a child gets an education and a fair go, a widow is not disadvantaged and alone and a family is not torn apart by the effects of post-traumatic stress or other psychological injuries.

So what is this post all about? My 1940 Chevrolet Ridemaster Deluxe was the actual car used by then Brigadier Stanley Savige Officer Commanding the 17th Brigade of the Australian 6th Division in the Middle East during our involvement in WW2 and later in both Crete and Greece. It was bombed and suffered damage in Greece in 1941 but did return to Australia in 1942. This year it is 100 years since the founding of Legacy Melbourne, (make that Australia) by Lt. General Stanley Savige and his mates. A Legacy Torch has travelled the world commemorating the formation and celebrating the centenary of Legacy. I was asked if I would take part in the celebrations in Melbourne on the 12th and 13th October 2023. Of course I agreed and set to readying the car. Thank you to lan and Heather for the parking space after I decided that trailering the car to Melbourne would make sure it got there.

My son Michael and two of my grand children joined me at the MCG for the Melbourne City torch leg and afterwards Jill joined me at Legacy House in Swanson Street for the official reception. Did you see us on the 'Today Show' last Thursday morning? Friday saw Jill and I drive Pride of Place, through Melbourne to the Shrine of Remembrance for the memorial service attended by the Governor General, David Hurley and his wife. We were invited to the official reception and spent a few hours in their company along with many other dignitaries.

With us also was 13 year old Isabella Bates who is at this stage the highest Victorian money raiser for the Legs for Legacy event. Isabella was only 12 when she started raising money for Legacy last March 2023 and has so far raised more that \$13,000. On Friday 13th October, Isabella received a medallion from the Governor Generals wife, Linda Hurley, for her money raising efforts. It is still not too late to donate.




You may have wondered how to make a small fortune. Dr. J. A. Purves in 1930 found a way. He started with a large fortune and built two totally impracticable vehicles. His inspiration came from a sketch by Leonardo DaVinci.

The first test drive was 1932. Observers must have thought that they were observing a novel and outlandish recreation vehicle. Purves intention was diametrically opposed to that notion. He envisaged his creation to be transport's

answer for the future.

His Dynasphere was shaped somewhat like a huge doughnut. To be precise, it was a hollow sphere with two domes removed. Remaining was an annular shape with a curved outer. It was fabricated from a series of large steel rings of varying diameter. Many lateral rods completed the rigid assembly.

People who keep gerbils or guinea pigs may provide them with an exercise wheel. The gerbil runs constantly inside the wheel as it spins on an axle. Now if the wheel was removed from the axle and placed on the floor, the wheel would progress forward as the gerbil runs inside. Now imagine a trolley to replace the gerbil, but in a giant wheel.





Purves constructed a trolley which fitted in his dynasphere. Its wheels ran on the outer steel rings which served as rail lines. The trolley was powered by a two cylinder 3 kw motor with a three speed gear box. As the trolley endeavoured to climb the rails, the dynasphere rolled forward. He also constructed an electric dynasphere.

. Purves considered that his dynasphere would pose a serious challenge to convential cars. As the device was not driven but rolled, then it would not become bogged. Its huge diameter would permit it to traverse very uneven, muddy, or slimy ground. The configuration needed only a small

motor, and hence economy was to be a strong selling feature.

The trolley provided seats for four people. Steering was effected by the occupant leaning out of the vehicle in the required direction of turn. It is hard to say which feature was least practical, steering or braking. At speed, which was about 44km/hr maximum, an attempt to hastily stop could result in gerballing. This term was derived from an energetic gerbil that could rotate with its wheel. Similarly, hasty braking could result in the trolley revolving with its giant steel doughnut. Steering was later refined somewhat later by a steering wheel that moved the trolley laterally, a task for well muscled arms.

One would expect that vision would be

much compromised by the lateral bars. At speed, the lattice of bars seemed to vanish. Tipping was not supposed to occur due to the low centre of gravity. This was generally so, although on one occasion, Purves did manage to tip the dynasphere. His comment was that all was well, as similar to a child's toy, the dynasphere would right itself.

Purves was so optimistic that he applied in1931 for a patent which was granted in 1935. He envisaged mass production of high speed vehicles and vehicles that could carry several people. Dynasphere busses were to be next. His patents expired in 1952. I seriously doubt that his patents disappointed others who considered producing similar vehicles.

. Videos of his operating dynasphere are available on YouTube and reveal its simplicity and impracticability. The concept, however, did not die. Meeting Notes of the AOMC Delegates Meeting Saturday August 26th, 2023 at 1pm. Venue: Ballarat North Community Centre, Ballarat North

There were 57 attendees representing 41 clubs, 2 visitors and 5 zoom attendees. Chair: lain Ross, Vice President AOMC.

Guest Speakers

Nick Scarff. A young enthusiast who is studying for a Degree in Design. His thesis is the marketing of early Jaguars in Australia. Member of the Jaguar Car Club and the Vintage Drivers Club. Nick gave an outline of his background with classic jaguars and his reasons for undertaking his thesis, highlighting the lack of academic histories on automobiles. He then gave an overview of his thesis, including a background on Brysons Industries who imported Jaguars in the 1960s.

Wayne Drew, President of the Ballarat Light Car Club. Wayne gave a presentation on the club and club activities. Club was founded in 1949 and runs various motorsport activities at a motorsport complex at Ballarat airport. This includes motorkhana events that is open to anyone over 12 yo. This teaches good basic driving skills. Club also holds off road rallies and a hill climb at Mt Leura in Camperdown. Wayne showed some videos of various club events and some historic footage of racing at the racecourse pre war.

Correspondence. AOMC secretary Tony Hall reported on several items of correspondence relevant to clubs.

- Incorporation Act information has been sent to clubs. AOMC have sought legal and accounting advice on the changes. Initially it looks like no major effect for clubs, but we will notify of advice when it is received.
- Cheque books are being fazed out, with banks ceasing to issue replacement books from November 2023. Clubs need to transfer to digital banking, or organise some extra cheque books soon.

 Treasurers Report. Mark Fenton, AOMC Treasurer, reported that the AOMC finances are currently in a healthy

The AOMC has been active in supporting the community through donations, for example: -

To Car Clubs...\$5,000. Charities...\$15,222. Other NFPs...\$2,155. Service Clubs...\$4,895. Total \$27,273. To be able to report significant community benefits in this way is useful to demonstrate the valuable contribution we make directly to the general community and adds to our credentials as we engage with external parties in our advocacy role. In coming months AOMC member clubs will also be asked to provide data about their own activities so that we can improve the reporting of the community benefits of the whole heritage vehicle movement.

*VicRoads/Club Permit Scheme Report. A*OMC have received reports of renewals being sent out without permit books. VicRoads have been contacted on this issue. VicRoads are aware of the issue and it can be rectified by ringing or attending VicRoads branch.

Ingredients

- 250 g butter softened
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/4 cup brown sugar firmly packed
- 1/2 cup condensed milk
- 2 tsp vanilla essence
- 165 g Maltesers roughly chopped
- 2 cup self-raising flour
- 1/2 cup plain flour

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C.
- 2. Beat butter and sugars in large bowl until pale. Add condensed milk and vanilla and beat a further 1 minute.
- 3. Add maltesers and flours. Stir with a large metal spoon until well combined.
- 4. Roll mixture into walnut sized balls. Place on lined baking trays and gently press down with a fork. (not too much as they spread a lot)
- 5. Bake 12-15 minutes. Transfer to wire rack for cooling. When completely cold store in air tight containers.
