THE BRIEF STORY OF MY 1934 PLYMOUTH DELUXE.


When British migrant James Alexander Holden arrived in Adelaide in 1852, he set about establishing a business as a leather worker and saddle-maker. In 1872 he set up a partnership with Birks, only to have it disolved 3 years later. Following that ill-fated partnership, Holden decided to bring his son into the business in 1879, and then allowed Henry Frost to join as Junior Partner in 1885; Frost was well respected carriage builder, and the company was soon to become "Holden and Frost". In 1910 Holden \& Frost began trimming motor vehicles and in 1914 they built their first one off car body for an imported Lancia chassis. Larger contracts followed but ironically the first major contract was for Dodge bodies (a later competitor).

By 1917 the Australian government had placed an import embargo on complete vehicles, the First World War having almost entirely involved Britain's industry, and German U Boat Captains were doing their best to ensure that very few cargo ships leaving North America reached their intended destination. These conditions, combined with the need to save valuable cargo space, restricted imports to chassis and forced local vehicle agents to look to local firms to provide the bodies. In 1919 Edward Wheeldon Holden registered "Holden's Motor Body Builders" as a separate company specialising in car bodies.

At the time they built bodies for Overland, Chevrolet, Durant, Hupmobile and Dodge, and by 1923 they were producing over 12,000 bodies per year. In 1924 "Holden's Motor Body Builders" became the sole Australian body builder for General Motors vehicles and had an output of over 22,000 bodies (over 11,000 for GM) in 65 different body styles.

To hear that between 1927 to 1943 Holden built and/or assembled cars such as Bedford, Buick, Chevrolet, Oldsmobile and Vauxhall would be no surprise to most people.
But most will be surprised to hear that during those early years Holdens also built bodies for Austin, Chandler, Chrysler, Clyno, Crowley, DeSoto, Dodge, Essex, Falcon-Knight, Fiat, Ford, GMC trucks, Graham, Graham-Paige, Hillman, Humber, Hudson, Hupmobile, LaSalle, Paige, Pontiac, Plymouth, Marquette, Morris, Nash, Oakland, Overland, Reo, Rover, Singer, Standard, Studebaker, Swift, Willys, Willys-Knight, Whippet, Wolseley, all the various WW2 Defence vehicles as well as several other marques.

By 1935 the Holden designers had developed the capacity to make an all-steel body for Chrysler, producing over 2,000 Chrysler C6 and Plymouth PJ sedan bodies. Body builder T J Richards held the majority of Chrysler bodywork but could not provide all Chrysler's needs. In 1937 the first all-steel body for GM was produced but it differed from that designed by Fisher Body in America. The installation of a large Hamilton press to stamp out the single roof panel also enabled the designers to produce a single side frame. This approach eliminated eight weld joints and provided an accurate door opening space. The result was vastly improved dust sealing, door fitment and alignment. A further advance was made in 1938 when the 'single-unit' body was built for the Vauxhall Wyvern. This unitary construction design was first used by GM at Opel (GM subsidiary in Germany) in 1935 but had its origins at the Lancia company as early as 1922. The unitary constructed body eliminated a need for a chassis by structurally adding extensions onto the body shell that held the power plant and suspension. In an unusual move Holden fitted this body to a chassis, defeating its design purpose, possibly to simplify manufacture as the commercial Vauxhalls required a chassis. It was these design features; all-steel bodies, single side frame and unitary body, coupled with many years' experience of producing rugged bodies to suit Australia's rural road conditions that placed the Holden body designers in an excellent position to produce the 48-215 Holden car in 1948.

## THE BRIEF STORY OF MY 1934 PLYMOUTH DELUXE.

My 1934 Chrysler Plymouth was imported into Australia as a complete rolling engine and chassis and delivered to Holden to have a body and interior completed to Chrysler specifications in a green colour. On completion, the car was delivered to Lanes Motors in Melbourne to fill an order for a Mr Frank Waterman of Centre Rd, Bentleigh on the 9/4/1935. It appears it stayed in the same family for 34 years but was reregistered 3 more times during this period.

## THE BRIEF STORY OF MY 1934 PLYMOUTH DELUXE.

Between 1969 and 1972 it changed ownership 3 times with Mr Alan Streatfeild, a Chrysler trained motor mechanic, purchasing it unregistered on the 20/7/1972. Alan owned the vehicle for 50 years, starting its 10 year restoration in May 1972. During the restoration Alan resprayed the vehicle in a genuine Chrysler Plum blue colour to match his other1934 Plymouth PE Deluxe sedan which is in original condition and still registered with its original plates.

My story begins in October 2021 wanting to find a club vehicle that was a bit more comfortable for all weather use I decided to list my 34 KC Dodge Ute on Facebook Marketplace. To my surprise it sold within half an hour. I now needed to find a replacement. ## Salmon/Crab Mornay Quiche

Olive oil
Flour
1 onion - finely chopped or shallots
Medium size tin of salmon or crab
Skim milk
3-4 eggs (depending on the size of your quiche dish)
Grated tasty cheese
Shaved parmesan


Green onion tops - finely sliced (a small amount for colour)
Red capsicum - finely chopped (again a small amount for colour)
Fresh parsley
Ground black pepper
Salt (if you want)
Pinch nutmeg
Frozen puff pastry

## Method

Drain salmon or crab reserving liquid. Make liquid up to $1 \frac{1}{4}$ cups with skim milk.

Cook onion in a little olive oil until soft (in medium saucepan). Remove from heat, Add 1 tablespoon flour and the milk mixture. Stir over low heat until boiling and thickened. Remove from heat.

Add green onion, red capsicum, parsley, salt, pepper, nutmeg, flaked salmon, or crab, beaten eggs and tasty cheese (as much or little as you like) and combine well.

Pour into quiche dish (which is already greased and lined with puff pastry) and top with shaved parmesan. Bake at medium temperature until puffed and brown (about 30-40 minutes in a moderate oven). Prebaking the pastry shell for about 10 min . should prevent a soggy bottom.
